Luminato Festival Toronto Announces October Lineup

Christine Brubaker, Edward Burtynsky, and Julien Christian Lutz pka Director X amongst those presenting World Premieres

June 15, 2021, (Toronto, Canada) – Luminato Festival Toronto – the city's international festival of arts and ideas – is collaborating with many of Canada's most renowned and provocative art makers to celebrate creativity, promote change, and bring connection back to the Greater Toronto Area this Fall, from October 13 to 17.

"As we look toward brighter days, Luminato is excited to announce a powerful series of immersive film and digital experiences, along with a special drive-in concert," says Luminato Festival Toronto CEO Celia Smith.

Luminato 2021 Details

Original works from Christine Brubaker, Edward Burtynsky, and Julien Christian Lutz pka Director X, will headline the October 2021 festivities. In a nod to the festival's traditional June timing, Luminato has launched *Luminato2021*, a virtual reality guide to the Festival 'inside' Toronto's iconic Great Hall, which will evolve over the summer months with more previews, highlights, and interactive elements added as the festival draws nearer.

From dance, music and visual art, to theatre, augmented reality, and digital photography, all grounded in the city-region, Luminato's full list of events (see below) begins in June and crescendos from October 13 to 17. A wide range of accessibility initiatives accompany and augment each event, with additional commissions filling out the Access Program. More details on collaborators and activities will be shared over the summer through Luminato's social channels and the virtual reality guide.

Edward Burtynsky's In the Wake of Progress

In the Wake of Progress is a new, immersive, digital experience from world-renowned Canadian photographer Edward Burtynsky. Created for the screens surrounding Toronto's Yonge-Dundas Square, and filmed by Bokeh Collective for the 2021 Festival's online audience, the piece tells the epic tale of humanity's impact on the planet through photographs and film from Burtynsky's 40-year career. Coproduced by Canadian music legend Bob Ezrin, featuring an original soundtrack by Phil Strong, with vocals by award-winning singer iskwē and performances by musicians of The Glenn Gould School at The Royal Conservatory of Music, In the Wake of Progress is an urgent call to action, and a quest for hope, as we face the greatest existential threat of our time: the climate crisis.

Henry G20 freely adapts Shakespeare's Henry V for a bold retelling of the conflict between police and protestors during the June 2010 G20 Summit in Toronto. Through a mobile app with both PodPlay and Augmented Reality experiences, Henry G20 addresses unanswered questions from that fateful weekend when hundreds of people, both protesters and innocent bystanders, were detained as part of the largest mass arrest in Canadian history.

Zaagidiwin (The Way We Love Each Other)

A global pandemic. Climate change. Racial injustice.

This is a moment to reflect on our social responsibilities and our relationship with nature. Nanabozo takes us on an adventure (or misadventure) from the land into the city core, revealing its beauty as well as its darkness. Through spoken word, music and song, healing is discovered as Nanabozo returns to the land, discovering its precious gifts and healing through dance.

Zaagidiwin asks us to consider the way in which we love one another and the land in which we share.

Jay Soule | CHIPPEWAR - Built On Genocide

Public Art Installation at Harbourfront Centre by Jay Soule | CHIPPEWAR World Premiere

Built on Genocide is a large-scale installation by multidisciplinary artist Jay Soule | CHIPPEWAR, reflecting the events and policies throughout Canada's history that have deliberately undermined and destroyed Indigenous livelihoods. The work is influenced by the mass genocide of the buffalo as a result



of the colonial railway expansion. The buffalo decimation is an underacknowledged but foundational aspect of "Canadian" history, with consequences that persist today. *Built on Genocide* addresses the direct correlation between the genocide of the buffalo and the genocide of Indigenous peoples in Canada.

Curated by Djennie Laguerre, this episode of Golden Hour focuses on how storytelling, in the form of folklore and personal mythology, shapes how we see ourselves and informs our moral codes. What are the stories we tell ourselves about the places and people we come from? How does that help us understand who we are as Canadians? This episode features the work of 3 powerful storytellers: Djennie Laguerre, Courage Bacchus and Diana Tso, performing in English and translated into multiple languages.

Desire Paths: Accessible Futures

Digital Magazine by Sticky Mangos Launches June 15

CRIP COLLAB is a collaborative zine featuring artists who belong to all three of these fantastic communities: Disabled, Racialized and 2SLGBTQ+. The zine is curated by a multiply disabled, chronically ill, cancer survivor, Pree Rehal. Luminato commissioned issue #3 focussing on Deaf artists, featuring Courage Bacchus as Contributing Editor. Crip, as a term, is a reclaimed slur that is used by some Disabled people.

Radio LUMI takes over ISO Community Radio to bring Luminato specially crafted programs for Blind & low vision audiences, which can be enjoyed by all. This disability-led initiative features exclusive artist interviews, audio description of *Golden Hour* Episode 2, and a behind-the-scenes look at Luminato's access programs and processes. Blind hosts Ramya Amuthan and Christine Malec are joined by audio describers JJ Hunt and Rebecca Singh; Station ID composed by G.R. Gritt.
