Scott Joplin's Treemonisha: A Musical Reimagining

Scott Joplin's Treemonisha was a landmark production for Luminato, telling the story of a Black woman's journey in the post-slavery era as she leads her community towards a new future. Presented by an historically all-Black cast and crew, this opera fused classical music with ragtime, folk, and gospel, serving as an example of how "art of the past can take on new life in a new era" (The New York Times).

At once intimate and expansive, Aalaapi invited audiences into the home of two young women living in Nunavik. It blended languages, visuals, and soundscapes to offer a sensory portrayal of life in the North.

Nuit (1986)

This Canadian contemporary dance classic choregraphed by Jean-Pierre Perreault was last presented 21 years ago. An energetic and demanding piece, Nuit (1986) enthralled audiences with its intense physicality, and the rhythmic power of the dancers turning their bodies into percussive instruments.


A Literary Legacy: 33 Years of CBC's Writers & Company

OUTSTANDING PROGRAMMING

Scott Joplin's *Treemonisha: A Musical Reimagining* was generations in the making. This monumental piece of opera is set after the abolition of slavery and written by a survivor of that era. The presenting partners worked together to bring a tragically overlooked piece back to life and shared it with over 4,800 people.

Loss deeply moved audiences at every performance. Written by Ian Kamau and his father Roger McTair, the retelling of an intergenerational family story explored grief in Afro-Caribbean communities. Accompanied by live music, Kamau invited the audience to heal together in a truly immersive and cathartic experience. Audiences had the option of pay-what-you-can tickets.

Aalaapi offered an intimate portrait of Inuit life in the North through documentary, radio testimonies, and live theatre. Audiences were touched by stories that spanned generations, and then shared freshly made bannock (pan-fried Indigenous bread) with each other during post-show discussions.

UNIQUE EXPERIENCES

Walk with Amal was a once-in-a-lifetime experience our audiences won't soon forget. By the time Little Amal arrived in Canada for the first time, the 12-foot puppet of a refugee girl had travelled to 90 cities across 13 countries, searching for a home. Over 5 days and 15 walks, Little Amal was joined by 80,000 people who flooded the streets to walk with her. Amal inspired curiosity, empathy, wonder, and affection in all who walked by her side.

Throughout her walks, Amal was joined by some impressive friends! Priyanka, winner of Canada's Drag Race Season 1, attended Amal's first walk in Toronto. She was greeted by Elder Duke Redbird, former Governors General of Canada Adrienne Clarkson and Michaëlle Jean, and Lieutenant Governor of Ontario Elizabeth Dowdeswell. Jamaal Magloire, Assistant Coach for the Toronto Raptors, attended the hip-hop-themed Walk in Scarborough.

A lot of audiences look for stories to tell their friends and memories to last a lifetime. Our Music Weekend delivered. Attendees were thrilled to catch acts like Snotty Nose Rez Kids, Tank and the Bangas, and Princess Nokia. We returned to our home base of David Pecaut Square and transformed it into a magical urban fairground. Massive audiences gathered to savour the memorable collision of art, music, and food.

INCLUSIVITY FIRST

As the cost of living continues to rise, we ensured many experiences were inclusive by having a zero-dollar price tag. One of those free offerings was *Dragon's Tale*: a sweeping opera that celebrated the Canadian-Chinese experience. It was enjoyed by almost 4,500 audience members outdoors, on Toronto's waterfront.

In 2023, we followed through on our commitment to create inclusive experiences for people with various abilities. Access Guides were available for neurodiverse audiences. Select live performances featured in-person audio description and interpretation by ASL performers. We offered designated accessible seating, 98% of which was used. Our partners were also invited to accessibility training, and ASL classes were held for volunteers.

One of our long-time volunteer team leads expressed repeatedly how she was struck by the depth and thoroughness of our Accessibility work. "I didn't understand until now that Accessibility is the core of Luminato. I volunteer at a lot of places, nobody else is doing this."

We made sure to include people at home, and around the world. 282,000 people virtually walked with Amal on TikTok Lives. Our *Illuminating Ideas* talk series offered live stream options, and Radio LUMI produced 40+ hours of audio content to reach audiences, no matter where they were, through broadcast and digital technologies.



ENGAGING AUDIENCES

At Luminato, we believe in *meaningful* audience development that reaches across communities and deepens our shared experience. In 2023, we lived those beliefs.





REACHING NEW AUDIENCES

As we returned in 2023, we took to the streets of our bustling city to reach new audiences.

Little Amal walked with audiences in Brampton, Mississauga, Etobicoke, East York, Scarborough, and downtown Toronto. She greeted children at the Rogers Centre in a collaboration with Rogers. The recorded meeting aired on the big screens of a Blue Jays game to 26,724 people and was later shared on Sportsnet, resulting in 894,800 impressions.

We joined forces with Branded Cities and The Local Collective to orchestrate a takeover of billboards at Yonge-Dundas Square, featuring a moving image of Amal walking from screen to screen.

At Union Station, Belonging Is reached audiences at one of the city's busiest hubs. Passers-by and community members were invited to explore their sense of belonging through daily prompts and engagements, ultimately co-creating a mural over the course of the festival.

We welcomed 443,000 in-person attendees and earned 453 million media story impressions and 4.2 million owned social media impressions. All told, we achieved an incredible 720 million total impressions.

ENGAGING MEANINGFULLY

The landmark premiere of Scott Joplin's Treemonisha engaged youth and community members through workshops and lectures. At the first preview, a group of 6-10-year-olds from Sistema Toronto were in attendance. Sistema is a free after-school music and social development program for children living in underserved communities, and they had participated in Treemonisha workshops for weeks. At this preview, the children, who had participated in Treemonisha workshops for weeks, had been invited to sing for the encore at the end of the performance. But in the middle of the show, the Sistema youth heard a song they recognized. They got to their feet and began singing with full voices - during the performance! A cast member later said, "they sounded like angels." It was an unforgettable moment that reminds us why we do what we do.

Little Amal from Walk with Amal Toronto inspired very meaningful engagement with her audience. Raniya, a 9-year-old mental health advocate who distributes care packages to children facing mental health challenges, was stirred by Amal's journey. At Amal's final walk with Luminato, as she boarded the tugboat to continue her search for a home, Raniya approached Amal with a parting gift: a package of items meant to bring comfort to children Amal would meet on her future travels. Through this and dozens more meaningful interactions, children of the GTA were connected to children around the world through Amal's message of hope.



CONTINUING THE CONVERSATION

It's important to us that our engagement doesn't stop when the festival wraps. We are continuing to have conversations with the partners and community groups we collaborated with in 2023, particularly through *Walk with Amal Toronto*. We are developing new projects with a desire to deepen those relationships in years to come.



IGNITING THE CITY

Since our beginning in 2007, Luminato has been a city-building festival. What is a great arts festival if not a way to bring a city to life and attract tourism? We invigorate the GTA with unique experiences, foster connections between the people who call it home, and inspire audiences to think and act in ways that make this city better for us all. 2023 was a shining example of this work.



IMPACTING THE ECONOMY

Over the years, we've not only contributed to the cultural fabric of the GTA and celebrated its diverse people: we've also attracted visitors, created jobs, and generated revenue for the city.

Our 2023 festival generated over \$57 million in economic impact via visitor spend.

Every year, Luminato invests a significant proportion of our budget into activities that benefit the Canadian economy. In 2023 we paid over \$650,000 to Canadian artists and companies, including \$118,000 in commissioning fees to develop new work and invest in our country's creative economy. To date, our commissions have invested nearly \$6 million back into Canada's creative economy.

ICNITING THE AUDIENCE

Part of our work to ignite a city means we elevate the everyday experiences of the people who live in it.

Jordan Bennett's *Echoes Calling Back* reminded us that the land on which we live, work, and play was once a beautiful landscape cared for by many Indigenous Peoples. Displayed at College Park in between highrises and shopping malls, 192,000 passers-by and art lovers were invited to consider our living history.

Illuminating Ideas brought world-renowned experts, makers, movers, and shakers to our audiences. We collaborated with our partners at Hot Docs, Word on the Street, the Toronto Public Library, York University, the Jackman Institute for the Humanities, and the Provocation Ideas Festival to ignite audiences with stimulating ideas.

As part of *Illuminating Ideas*, Quinn Hopkins' *Meeting* of the *Doodem* brought mesmerizing digital sculptures to festival spaces. Audiences could scan a QR code to access animated, augmented reality monuments inspired by Anishinaabe pictographs, artworks, and stories.

The opening night of Scott Joplin's Treemonisha was also a special moment, celebrating Black culture and the Black community's contribution to the arts. A black carpet was rolled out in front of the St. Lawrence Centre on Front Street. Well-known civic leaders, artists, and media personalities attended. The creative team, cast and audiences wore black and gold, catching the attention of onlookers. For this historically all-Black cast and creative team, wearing black spoke to the "dark richness of our ancestors and soil imbued with our blood, sweat, and tears" while the gold represented a "rise from the darkness...the beauty we have created, the community we have fostered, and the power we possess as a people" [from the Opening Night invitation].

ACTIVATING THE ARTS COMMUNITY

In 2023, we worked with over 600 artists. We staged 4 world premieres, 1 Canadian premiere, and 4 commissions. We are immensely proud of this contribution to the local, national, and global arts community.

Illuminating works, our annual industry series, connected Canadian artists to the international scene. It featured showcases, pitch sessions, and networking opportunities with notable artists including Cliff Cardinal, Aisha Sasha John, Milton Lim & Patrick Blenkarn, PJ Prudat & Jonathan Seinen, Faisal Anwar, Nina Lee Aquino & Romeo Candido, and HAUI & Sheree Spencer.

Nuit (1986) introduced a whole new generation to the rigorous artistry of choreographer Jean-Pierre Perreault. This historic remounting was created with a new generation of dancers by Compagnie de la Citadelle, sparking an exciting new era for dance in Canada.

Kalena Bowell was the first Black woman conductor in Canadian opera history and led the first all-Black orchestra in the country for *Scott Joplin's Treemonisha*.

We also remained committed to our Artist in Residence program, supporting three artist-curators to develop seedling ideas into full proposals. Artists Pree Rehal, Duane Bobbsemple, and Jim LeFrancois emerged with powerful proposals and plans to bring their projects to life.

A Literary Legacy: 33 Years of Writers & Company celebrated the enormous contributions made by host Eleanor Wachtel to the literary landscape of Canada. Luminato was privileged to host a live taping of the show's last original episode, in honour of its 33-year history and Ms. Wachtel's esteemed broadcasting career, spanning more than four decades.




